

Bryan Dangerous: *New show coming to Broadway*

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gling show that's been added to Broadway at the Beach's Coca-Cola Summer Nights entertainment series.

"It's more about the comedy than the juggling," Fulton said in describing the show. "The juggling is what's gaining attention, about breaking down that wall."

The show debuts Aug. 3 and takes place on the Heroes Harbor stage next to Jimmy Buffet's Margaritaville.

There are two shows at 6 and 9 p.m., with the first show lasting about 20-25 minutes and the later show continuing for about 35 minutes.

They will run five days a week, from Wednesday to Sunday.

Shows are free to the public. They will run through Sept. 3.

"Family friendly," "clean" and "highly interactive" are some of the phrases Fulton uses to describe the show.

Fulton said the show is highly dependent upon audience participation and interaction.

"I lose five pounds a show," he said. "I have a couple of scripted pieces,

but the best part is not knowing where the entertainment will take you. There's a real improv factor."

Fulton is no stranger to the entertainment world.

After attending Patapsco High School and Center for the Arts in Baltimore, Md., he graduated from the Ringling Brothers & Barnum and Bailey Clown College.

Fulton spent six years with the circus, traveling all around the world. Today he and his wife, Stephanie Fulton, co-own All-Star Talent, a local talent agency.

His highlight came during a show at Madison Square Garden, where he caught a hat on his head after it had been dropped from 300 feet in the air.

"Nothing is as intense as having 20,000 people cheer wildly for you," Fulton said.

"I still get goose bumps talking about it."

Fulton's audience at Broadway at the Beach will be a little more modest – about 150 people per show – but his desire to mesmerize the masses is just as sprightly.

"It's very family friendly. Five or six of my acts will involve someone from the audience," he said. "That way the audience feels like they're part of the show."
